Comments:

Throughput for the Burdekin mills in week five was good with just over 370,000 tonnes of cane put through the rollers. This brings the season total to just over 1.65M tonnes.

This was a pleasing result given two factories lost time to unplanned stops. Kalamia Mill had unscheduled stops early in the week to replace a pan door, and replace a broken roller in the bagasse system. Inkerman Mill had an extended stop to repair some leaking boiler tubes. All factories crushed very well for the remainder of the week.

Average weekly CCS was 14.06. This was again well above budget thanks to the dry cool conditions.

The highest CCS sample was 16.9 from a rake of Q240 plant cane in the Invicta Mill area.

- **First 2021-Season sugar shipped:** QSL has dispatched its first shipment of sugar from the current harvest. The cargo of 42,000 tonnes of raw sugar from the Burdekin was shipped on the Pacific Integrity out of Townsville for a refinery customer in South Korea. QSL General Manager Marketing Mark Hampson said South Korea was one of Australia's largest raw sugar markets, and had been one of QSL's key customers for nearly 50 years. "While we've had other shipments this year, those previous cargos delivered sugar produced last season," he said. "Queensland's sugar is in high demand, so this first 2021-Season shipment marks the start of very a busy shipping program which will stretch through until mid-next year, with exports already planned for refining customers in South Korea, Indonesia, Japan and the USA."
- Additional tonnage now available: As of 1 July 2021, QSL growers can access additional GEI tonnage to price in the 2023 and 2024 Seasons, with committed pricing levels now as follows:

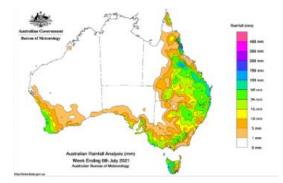

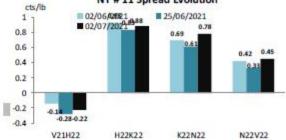

NY # 11 Spread Evolution

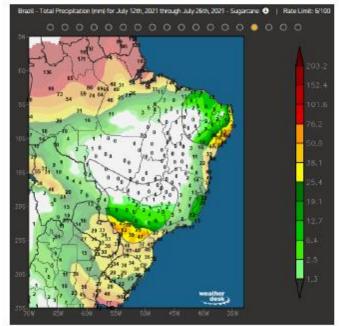

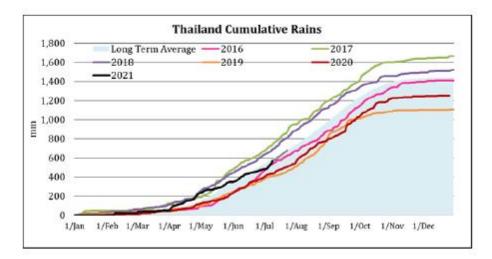

 NY Flat Price: NY#11 sugar market has cooled down against Brazilian sugarcane frost news. Most active October contract weakened from 18.35 cts/lb to 17.28 cts/lb, losing 107 points over last trading week and erasing all the price gain from one week before.

NY Spread: Nearby NY#11 October21/March22



- spread marked most recent lows of -0.38 cts/lb carry. October21/March22 spread is now testing -0.40 cts/lb support, which is lowest level during last trading year.
- London Market: London white sugar market is following NY#11 market. Nearby August21 contract is going to expire this week. Nearby August/October21 spread remains in wide carry of -26 USD/mt.
- COT Report (06/07/2021): Overall specs net long position further increased from 190.4k lots to 222.8k lots, adding 32.4k lots over last week. Commercials shorts have been selling into the rally. Commercials have increased their shorts positions from 692k lots to 735k lots.

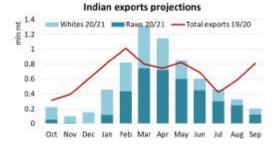

- 20/21 Mexico domestic sugarcane crushing campaign is coming to its end. As of 3rd July, there is only 1 mill that remains crushing in sugarcane field.
- Mexico is finishing tail of its sugarcane crop. Cumulative sugarcane crush has reached 51.2 million mt and cumulative sugar production have reached 5.706 million mt.
- World Market tonnage is estimated to have all shipped (at around 330k).
- Mexico is on track to fulfil the requirement to the USA.

India: Export Update



- India have continued to export raws and whites sugar in good progress in May 21.
- For May 21 exports, Indian has exported 475k mt raws to the international market, 52k mt to coastal refineries and 250k mt LQWs to the world market.
- Potentially there is more domestic market contracted without subsidy (OGL) in Q3 with 200k upside to our initial assumption (500k).

The second half June crush shows year-on-year higher cane crushed at 45 million mt vs 43.07 last year as mills are maximizing capacity.

ATR at 141.8 kg is quite good, with improvement over first half June, and over same time period for the previous 3 years; dryness has helped the concentration of ATR.

Sugar mix is high compared to the previous year; hence sugar production is quite high at 2.89 million mt.

Crush activities are to be watched for next 2 weeks to see the impact of the frost.
