### Comments:

Throughput for the Burdekin mills in week seven was down with just over 350,000 tonnes of cane processed.

The below-budget result was mainly due to superheater tube failures in Inkerman Mill's No.1 boiler, which resulted in about 50 hours of lost time.

The stops were caused by chemical carry-over from the boiler feedwater into the steam circuit.

All Inkerman burnt cane was processed before the factory was shut down on Saturday night, to enable work teams to carry out detailed investigations and corrective actions.

Average weekly CCS was 14.45. This was again well above budget thanks to the dry cool conditions.

The highest CCS sample was 17.8 from a rake of Q240 plant cane in the Invicta Mill area.

# 4. QSL Information Brief - 26th July 2021 - Posted - 26/7/21



### • Final 2020-Season Advance payment

The final QSL Advance payment for the 2020 Season was made last week to all QSL growers except those in Mackay milling districts. Unfortunately Mackay Sugar on Thursday advised that due to technical issues they cannot provide the data required for Mackay growers' final 2020-Season QSL payment until 29 July. This means that the final 2020-Season payment for these growers has been delayed until Friday, 30 July.

# • New GST arrangements – Wilmar districts

QSL's new simplified GST arrangements for our growers in Wilmar milling districts are now in place. 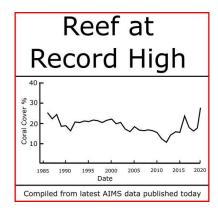

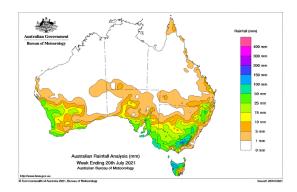

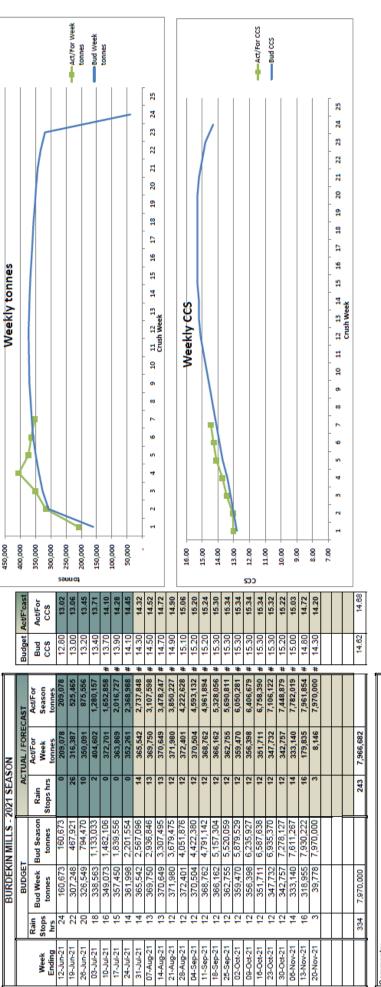

- Thank you for your patience as we work towards the resumption of normal operations.

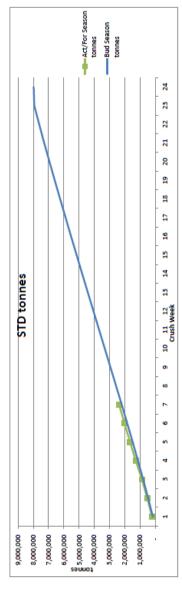

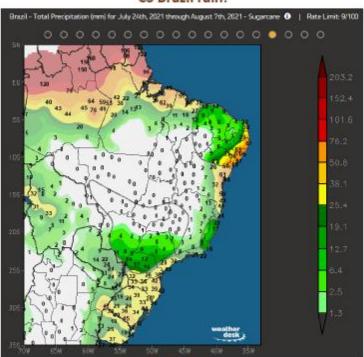

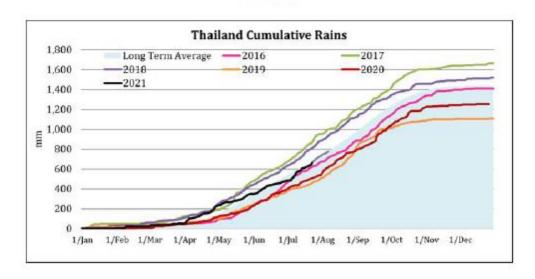

 NY Flat Price: NY#11 sugar market continued to consolidate early last week. On Friday the market made a 52 point breakthrough, due to another wave of frost warning in CS Brazil. NY Coffee market reacted more intensively to the frost news and was up 18% over the last week.



- NY Spread: Unlike the strong flat price performance,
   NY nearby spread remain relatively weak. Nearby October/March spread closed at 43 points carry, which is a drop of 6 points week on week.
- London Market: London white sugar market is also weaker than NY#11 raws market. Most
  active October contract drops from 460 USD/mt to 455 USD/mt, losing 5 USD/mt week on
  week. October/October white premium has further weakened to 57 USD/mt, which is the
  lowest level over the past year.
- COT Report (20/07/2021): Speculation community slightly increased their net long position from 193.5k lots to 198k lots. Index traders have liquidated 6k of net long position and increase 2k of net short position. Not much position change for commercial positions.

CS Brazil experienced a 2<sup>nd</sup> wave of cold fronts over the weekend, with potentially another one to come at end of this month. We are currently foreseeing a <u>possibility</u> for CS Brazil to produce 510 million mt or less of cane this season, down from the 530 million mt previously expected. The effect of the drought and frosts on cane replanting will also affect the 22/23 sugar production.



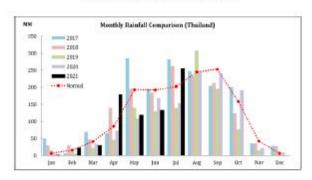

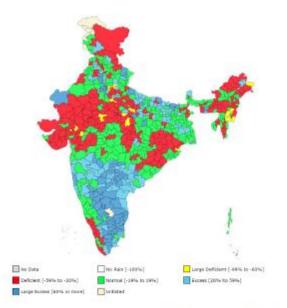


Thailand: Rainfall Update



- Rainfall in Thailand sugarcane area have been good during last week. 55 mm rainfall was being received.

- We expect Thailand sugarcane area to receive more than 250 mm rainfall in July 21, which is close to July 17 (282 mm) and July 18 (262 mm). Cumulative rainfall continues to be in line with the long term average volume.

India: Monsoon Update



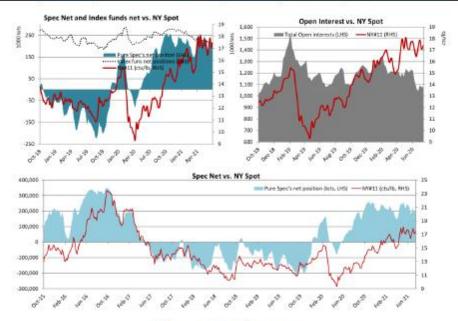
▶ India's monsoon has in general been positive for sugarcane growing areas. In the major sugarcane areas of Maharashtra and Karnataka, cumulative rainfall has been between 10-20% more than normal vs historical average. When combined with the sugarcane area expansion in Maharashtra, it is quite optimistic at current stage for 21/22 Indian domestic sugar production outlook.
