Disease workshops postponed due to flood event

SRA has cancelled two disease workshops scheduled for this week as a result of flood impacts in South-East Queensland.

The events were to have been hosted at SRA's Woodford site, but flood waters cut access, making it unsafe to access the site.

Manager - Biosecurity and Disease Screening, Nicole Thompson said while the team was disappointed to postpone the workshops, it was the appropriate decision to ensure the safety of SRA employees and guests.

"We plan to reschedule the events and will be in touch with registered participants when further information is available," Nicole said. "We look forward to hosting industry guests when the risk of further flooding passes and the ground dries out."

Assessment process for flood damaged farms gets under way

Gowers in southern Queensland and northern New South Wales affected by the severe rain event can access a range of government support.

Queensland growers. In Queensland, farmers who need assistance to get their farming business up and running should consider completing the Department of Agriculture and Fisheries' (DAF) online Natural Disaster Impact Survey. Completing this will speed up the assessment process.

Growers can describe damage to infrastructure, crops and livestock – and upload photos. Details of financial assistance currently available for natural disasters can be found at www.daf.qld.gov.au.

Farmers without power and the internet, can also report damage and seek information about assistance via the DAF customer service centre on 13 25 23.


