Jason Eglinton departure

"This is an exciting and challenging opportunity for Jason, and we wish him every success," Mr Coffey said.




Jason will depart SRA on 11 July. SRA will undertake an international search for his replacement.

Complete genome sequence of modern sugarcane variety announced by Australian team

SRA Interim CEO Shaun Coffey has congratulated Dr Nathalie Piperidis, SRA's Cytogeneticist based at Mackay station for the part she has played in the collaborative team which has cracked the genetic code of a modern sugarcane cultivar called R570.

"This is great and exciting news," Shaun Coffey said. "The sequencing of the sugarcane genome is very significant, given its amazing complexity.

"Nathalie is one of the world's most renowned sugarcane cytogeneticists. For the past 10 years she has worked with a team of more than 30 researchers world-wide including Professor Robert Henry from The University of Queensland and Dr Karen Aitken from CSIRO in Australia.

"To improve the analysis of the genome composition of modern cultivars and their parental species, Nathalie developed a new cytogenetic method called 'whole chromosome painting' in 2020. The technique was used to provide accurate genomic data used for the sequence assembly of R570, for example the accurate number of chromosomes in R570 and the proportion of the two different Saccarum species of R570. This technique contributed to the breakthrough in the genetic code.

"Having the team's paper published in *Nature*, the world's leading multidisciplinary science journal, is a pinnacle achievement for any researcher."

10th Anniversary Research Fund - progress in awarding funding

Presentations were made at each of the Regional Sugar Milling Seminars in March by SRA's Head of Research Strategy and Investment, Jane Trindall (Mackay), Research Manager, Stephen Mudge (Townsville, Gordonvale and Rocky Point) and Head of Partnerships and Project Management, Bronwyn Venus (Bundaberg), about progress on the awarding of project funding for the SRA 10th Anniversary Research Fund.

Stage 1 closed on 20 December last year with a total of 163 concept notes submitted by researchers. Agronomy topics topped submission categories, followed by crop protection, diversification, varieties, milling, adoption, capacity/capability, environment and other.

A preliminary review of all concepts was completed by SRA. Following this, assessment was undertaken by expert Review Groups in specialist areas between 7 and 28 March. The Research Funding Panel is reviewing these assessments and will make recommendations for Stage 2 of the process this month. A call will be made for detailed proposals under Stage 2 in May with projects expected to commence in July - September this year.

The aim of the fund is to provide \$16 million over the next three-four years to foster greater collaboration across the whole research sector; build more engagement with, delivery to industry; and to increase research and development activity in the industry.

Get on the bus for two unique Southern District Sugar Industry Day Tours


There's not one but TWO opportunities for southern sugarcane growers to try a whole new field day experience in May when the Southern District Bus Trips will be held.


