
Having the shadow ministries of Mines and Natural Resources, Fire and Emergency Services and Corrective Services, there was plenty to prosecute.

Estimates revealed this year we have 200 less men and women in orange across our state while our marine rescue volunteers in VMR and Coast Guard are left to navigate through a scrambled process during the creation of Marine Rescue Queensland.

It wasn't just the floundering when it came to our volunteers that was brought under the microscope this week, with confirmation Labor simply don't get it when it comes to supporting our firefighters in Ayr. More on that below.

Fire Station commitment smothered

As I said earlier, Estimates Hearings are largely about ensuring that money spent by the state government is able to provide our state services with the resources and infrastructure needed to support Queenslanders.

However right now in the Burdekin there is an example where the the state Labor government has allowed the complete opposite to happen and sadlty it's our front line emergency services that will bear the brunt.

The Commissioner has revealed that there is no intent or funding to build Ayr firefighters a new station after it was revealed that the current, 65-year-old

station, would need to be dug up to remediate a toxic chemical compound contamination. Currently our firefighters are unable to undertake vital training activities at the station and, unsurprisingly there is no assurances that following the completion of the works, those activities will be able to commence.

It doesn't stop there either, at the same time as our firefighters in Ayr have been unable to use the station to its full capacity, the state Labor government cut the ribbon on a \$6 million fire station in Brisbane knowing that it would need to be bulldozed within the following ten years to make room for road construction.

It's a slap in the face by Labor for people who sign up to put their lives at risk for the safety of their community and I certainly won't stand by and let our hardworking firefighters put up with a substandard fire station.

Roads reap headlines again
