





Surveys at fishways: Strong results

Six fishways built between Tully and Crystal Creek near Paluma have together opened 100+ kilometres of creek and river systems – and recent surveys show they are super highways. More than 4,500 fish were caught and released during monitoring work at four rock ramp fishways, including juvenile barramundi, empire gudgeon, rainbow fish, tarpon and long-finned eels.

Eight of the 16 native species recorded at the fishways were diadromous - meaning they need to move between salt and freshwater to complete their lifecycles - and they're the species these fishways are targeting. The structures are a solution for barriers like weirs, pipes and culvert crossings.

"Three times the grass" at Glen Ruth Station

Hear from grazier Curtis Archer who has been working with us to boost productivty and reduce erosion on the family's 33,000ha cattle station through natural grazing practices. He's got "three times the volume of grass" since dividing large paddocks and introducing three-paddock stock rotation systems in the river

country and on the creek flats. It has led to more even grazing as well as pasture diversity while also reducing woody thickening and weeds.

This video is part of our Upper Herbert Sediment Reduction Project, funded by the partnership between the Australian Government's Reef Trust and the Great Barrier Reef Foundation.

Improving soil health with Michael Waring

Michael grows sugarcane on 139 hectares near Ingham and uses diverse cover crops as part of his soil management. He keeps the plant biomass growing for as long as possible before terminating it in preparation for the next cash crop. By doing this, he's improving soil health, reducing the need for weed control and saving time across the board. Another practice that's helping to boost soil health is minimum tillage when he's getting planting beds ready for the next crop. He's managed to reduce tillage passes from 10 to five, minimising soil compaction.

Michael is one of more than 20 farmers featured in the 'Tropical Soils - A Guide to Soil Health Handbook' – a practical guide to managing and improving soil health as a farmer or grazier in the tropical areas of northern Australia. This handbook was created by Terrain NRM, Reef Catchments and Gulf Savannah NRM with support from the Wet Tropics Sugar Industry Partnership and Soil Land Food, and funding from the Australian Government's National Landcare Program.


Teamwork: Saving endangered mahogany gliders

The final stage of this wildlife crossing for endangered mahogany gliders was recently completed in the Kennedy Valley, south of Tully, thanks to team work by conservationists, landholders, industry and innovators. The top strand of wire on this fence is now barbless wire, beside the glider poles. So gliders now have a much less treacherous path to travel between pockets of habitat. Kudos to Mahogany Glider Recovery Team members - to the local branch of Wildlife Queensland for supplying the barbless wire, to the landholder, industry and the local council, and to all volunteers who made this happen. It takes a team and in the week of National Threatened Species Day, this video shows the importance of all recovery teams across the Wet Tropics.

Workshop: Natural Intelligence Farming - Nurturing Microbiomes: Saturday 19 October. Tinaroo Lake Resort. A Wet Tropics Soilcare event. Learn from Di and Ian Haggerty and Jane Slattery. Di and Ian haven't used pesticides, chemical nitrogen, phosphorous or potassium fertilisers for almost 20 years. They focus on nitrogen-fixing plants, homemade biological brews and improving diversity of 'below ground stock' – bacteria, fungi, protozoa, worms and arthopods.

Hooked on Healthy Waterways: Calling fish enthusiasts! Grants for landholders, indigenous, community groups...

<u>Landcare Australia Community Grants:</u> \$5000 - \$20,000 grants to restore wildlife habitat, shelterbelts and fences, protect waterways, manage weeds and feral animals, work with Traditional Owners, host community workshops, buy plants and equipment etc. Apply by Friday 20 September.

Engaging Science Grants: Up to \$20,000 for STEM-based events or education and engagement projects (science, technology, engineering and maths) to increase public awareness of science, promote science literacy and STEM careers. Apply by 4pm 27 September.

NAB Foundation Community Grants: Up to \$25,000 grants for local projects that help communities withstand and recover from natural disasters, including Environment and Wildlife grants for restoration of damaged vegetation and habitat, and rehabilitation of injured wildlife. Apply by Monday 30 September.

Environmental grants: Up to \$2000 from the Tablelands Regional Council for regeneration projects, tree stocks for planting, climate mitigation and adaptation actions, capacity building, education and awareness regarding sustainability and environment management...

<u>Discounted eco-loans for farmers, land managers and small to medium business owners:</u> An Australian Government initiative for things like electric vehicles, rooftop solar, batteries, energy-efficient machinery and equipment including tractors, harvesters, earthmovers and cranes.

<u>Strengthening Rural Communities – Prepare & Recover Program grants:</u> Up to \$25,000 for a broad range of initiatives that focus on community-led resilience-building. Apply by Thursday 5 September to the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal.

Queensland Feral Pig Initiative: Queensland Government funding for regionally-agreed cluster fencing arrangements, invasive plant and animal control, and capacity-building projects. Apply by 5pm on 13 September.

<u>Wettenhall Environment Trust – Small Environmental Grants Scheme:</u> \$2000 to \$15,000 grants to support grass roots organisations, individuals and academics for projects making a positive difference to the biodiversity conservation in land, sea or air, rural or urban areas.

<u>Purves Environmental Fund:</u> Expressions of interest are invited for projects that tackle degradation of wilderness, over exploitation of natural resources and/or pollution.

Farm Management Grants Scheme: A 50% rebate on the cost of eligible professional advice, up to a maximum of \$2500, to produce a Farm Business Resilience Plan. A Queensland Rural and Industry Development Authority initiative.



Nominate for the Bob Hawke Landcare Award

This national award recognises an individual, group or organisation involved in championing landcare and inspiring others to take action on their property or in their community. It acknowledges a remarkable commitment to caring for the land with improved sustainable land management practices, and efforts to share knowledge with others. The award includes a \$30,000 grant package for further development of knowledge and skills in sustainable land management. This is an Australian Government and Landcare Australia initiative. Nominations close on Saturday 31 December.
